Looking for the Ripple Effect is a professional development resource for Settlement Service Provider Organizations in British Columbia, Ontario, the Atlantic Provinces, and the Prairie and Northern Territories who offer IRCC-funded direct and indirect services.

Participants can access the online modules individually or as part of a cohort. Over the course of three months, participants can work through the modules in sequence or select specific topics of interest in random order. Along with written content, there are brief audio recordings, downloadable templates, and opportunities for live discussions.

Purpose of the Modules

The hope is that after working with the modules, Settlement SPOs will feel more confident about strategically gathering outcomes and impact data. The hope is further that SPOs will produce more powerful impact stories for use in proposals, communications, and narrative reporting. These impact stories can include collective impact, GBA Plus, and Indigenous evaluation perspectives. The work of the settlement sector is vitally important not just to individual newcomers and their families but to communities, systems, and Canada's future.

Target Audience/Eligibility

Settlement sector organizations with IRCC-funded direct and indirect services are eligible to register. The modules have been developed for managers and other staff with evaluation responsibilities, but frontline program staff also benefit, especially from the first five modules. Organizations can register up to four participants. Larger organizations wishing to register more than four participants can be accommodated by special arrangement.
